#### LET'S BEGIN!

Illustrating children's books is a dream job, and it's a fantastic industry to be involved in.

I'm exposed to a lot of artwork every day, in all styles and media. It's great! Yet, all too often I see artists not quite making the grade. Why? Because they haven't gone the extra mile. We're going to fix all that in class!

Artists need to show me these FOUR key items:

- Really strong characters
- Characters showing emotion
- Inspiring environments
- An appealing style

### ALL ABOUT CHARACTER

Weeks 1 and 2 of the course are all about **character**. We have dedicated two weeks to it because it's the number one thing in a children's book – without a good character, you don't have a story.

A character can be a person, animal or even a 'thing' (like a pencil or a stick for example). The character must have personality and life and be able to tell us a story. We need to completely believe in them; love them or loathe them!

#### CREATING WINNING CHARACTERS

Lilla asked me seven brilliant questions, which I have answered in lesson 1 to give you a deeper insight into how to create winning characters. Here's a sneak peek at some of the questions and my answers (covered in much more detail in the course):

- In what style should I draw my characters? You can draw your character in any style, just as long as it's unique to you! We love all the different artwork styles we see in the classroom, some are simple and some are complex, anything goes. Sometimes the most memorable ones are deceptively simple, like Eric Carle's Very Hungry Caterpillar.
- **How do I make a character complex?** This is where the magic happens, and we will guide you through the process step-by-step. By the end of the 5 weeks, your character will be singing and dancing its way around the pages of your book. We'll look at how to add emotions to your character, not just through the facial expressions, but in every detail of the body. How do you make a villain look mean, or your hero look sad? All will be revealed!
- Does a child need to relate to the character and why? Absolutely. This is the number one most important thing in a picture book. No matter how beautiful the artwork is, or how great the story, if the child does not identify or connect with the character, they won't love the book. The reader needs to want your character to either succeed or fail, and this will drive the story forward.
- **How might an accessory help?** This is a wonderful way to make your character unique to you. When you design your character, think about qualities that are interesting and unusual. Something distinctive that will mark the character out as an individual. It helps to look to the things around you, in your home, for that extra special unique combination.
